


MESOPOTAMIA - 1916




TOP SECRET

Orders for the 6th Battalion.

Proceed to trenches at Hanna, just north of the city of Kut.

Trenches there are of vital importance. The Ottomans have been laying siege to the city since December 1915 with the 6th Division of the Indian Army trapped inside.

The trenches at Hanna will be used as a launching point for an attack on Kut to relieve the siege. The men trapped in Kut are relying on you!






OK, HERE WE ARE LADS.



THE LADS ARE GETTING FED UP

MORNING NEWS

The siege of Kut is finally over, All efforts to free Kut failed with many men dying during the attempts to free it. It is estimated that 30,000 men died trying to free Kut.

Finally General Townshend, trapped inside Kut surrendered himself and his men.
